

The AOCC Conference starts soon in Logan, and I understand a number of you will be attending that.



AOC. Orchid Conference

Why attend an Orchid Conference? There are plenty of reasons, from supporting the Orchid growing community and helping make the event a success to buying that special new addition for the shade house, or to meet old friends that share your interest and to make new acquaintances. What about to seeing fantastic flowering orchids and displays or share the wisdom of some of the best orchid growers in Australia? Often it is for all of the above reasons! The standard of orchid displays at AOCC22 was good and special mention should go to the Calliope Orchid and Foliage Society for their display and to Jenni Scott for displaying some excellent quality orchids that won many first prizes and a couple of Section Champions. A great effort Calliope, well done!

The 22nd Australian Orchid Conference was staged at Logan a few days ago. I attended as a registrant and was involved in the judging, which was all very interesting, but the value to me was in the few 'light bulb' moments and snippets of knowledge that came from the various speakers in the lecture program.

Of note was Prof. Kingsley Dixon speaking on the efforts to conserve native orchids in Western Australia, particularly terrestrials, and how we might be able to tap into that knowledge here.

Dr Marion Davies (the new AOC President) from Darwin spoke on growing Bulbophyllums in the top end particularly using plastic 'gutter guard' fashioned into poles which are filled with growing media. A good way to grow the rambling types of Bulbophyllums which are often otherwise grown in shallow pots. She also gave another talk on growing non-standard Vandas.

Fred Clarke of Sunset Valley Orchids in USA is always entertaining, easy to listen to and very informative. He spoke on new directions in breeding of 'Catasetums' particularly the black *Catamodes* that he is working on. He gave 4 talks in all, with the second on breeding 'blue' Cattleyas, the third on "Becoming an 80th percentile grower" emphasizing the need to get the basics right, and finally a talk on breeding Mini - Cattleyas. Some fantastic mericlones will be hitting the market soon.

Michael Coker spoke on growing Phragmipediums and Paphiopedilums which was of particular interest to me, and something he said will probably solve a problem that I had been having.

Scott Barrie of Barrita Orchids spoke on growing modern Epidendrums. It was interesting to hear how he grows them on a commercial scale in a medium of basically just polystyrene.

I consider the effort and cost of getting to an orchid conference well worth it and encourage members to consider a holiday in Perth in 2025 for the next Australian Orchid Conference!

Soft Cane Dendrobiums

Soft cane dendrobiums originated from Asia. They are part of the very large Dendrobium genus and are a little different to most peoples' idea of orchids. Every year they produce new "canes", between 40-100 cm long, with alternating pale green leaves. The flowers are generally produced on the previous year's leafless canes, although the latest breeding has produced plants that flower on the current cane. Why these orchids are so popular then becomes immediately obvious. Their colour ranges from pure white to yellow, pale pink to purple, all depending on their parentage. Often the lip is a deep purple with shading to paler petals. The effect is very attractive. Clever crossing of orchids has increased the colour range and Sydney has an ideal climate for them.

Soft cane dendrobiums will grow happily in most back yards. They need to be potted in a mixture of treated pine bark or orchid mix. The mix needs to be rapidly draining or the roots will not grow, and they like to dry out between waterings. This does not harm the plants at all and in fact they seem to thrive on neglect. For feeding they need half-strength fertiliser every one to two weeks; any fertiliser will do. In winter, watering and feeding should be decreased or ceased depending on their situation. Older hybrids tend to produce plantlets instead of flowers if over watered in winter. As with most orchids they should be watered frequently when in active growth or in flower and much less when dormant.

Light is important to induce flowering but preferably filtered light in summer, so the foliage does not burn. Under trees or open bushes is ideal and the plants grow very well in hanging pots where there is good air movement. They can also be grown in a shade house under 50% shade cloth. Once the plants are in bud, move them to a sheltered area such as a veranda to keep rain off the buds. Water sitting on the buds can induce fungus with spotting or even bud drop. Good results have been achieved by hanging the plants on eastern facing fences and the clothes lines.

They also grow very well on host trees (trees that don't shed their bark). Softcane Dendobiums make ideal landscaping plants in the Sydney area particularly in the frost-free areas.

Large plants can have hundreds of flowers every year and survive for many years with a minimum of care. These orchids are readily available from orchid nurseries or through societies. Several Australian nurseries are amongst the world leaders in their culture.
